The golf course will be changing out the yellow stakes found around the lakes on 13, 17 and 18 for red ones in the near future. When that takes place, those areas can be played as a lateral water hazard, thus providing you with another option for playing a shot after one has entered the water. It is important, however, to properly understand the rule. If your ball completely carries over the lake on 17, lands on grass that is not in the hazard and then rolls or spins back into the water, you can drop on the other side of the lake, no closer to the hole with a stroke penalty. If your ball hits the concrete wall on the opposite side of the lake and lands in the water, the concrete wall is inside the hazard, so you do not get to drop on the other side of the water.
